# Letter from the CEO

I feel like Read Better Be Better (RBBB) grew up a lot this year. Our organization is laser-focused on one issue: Arizona's literacy crisis. There comes an innate confidence from settling into doing one thing and doing it well: inspiring and equipping middle schoolers to help struggling 3rd grade readers improve their comprehension. In our fourth year of programming, our team, board members and the community are clear about who we are, what we do and why we do it. It has been a privilege to see an identity and a culture built around our mission to help children improve literacy skills and become better learners and also our values: Be Excellent and Be Kind.

"Today's youth are tomorrow's leaders. RBBB shows kids that obstacles are really opportunities. Ers want to do better - be better. Middle school-to fulfill their wants and needs by pairing them. In collaboration and education."

Having just one program means that our message to the community is simple: Did you know that only 31% of economically-disadvantaged 3rd grade students in Arizona scored proficient on the 3rd grade English Language Arts portion of AzMERIT? Did you know that reading below grade level proficiency makes them 4 times less likely to graduate high school? Did you know that if we can get them reading at grade level, then there is an 89% chance that they will graduate high school? Did you know that RBBB is a nonprofit that supports schools to improve 3rd grade reading proficiency by engaging middle schoolers to work through a curriculum, focused on comprehension, in an after-school setting? Did you know that students who complete RBBB improve nearly 21% more than their non-participating peers on standardized reading comprehension tests?

We can help you do something about this crisis.

We engage and empower our funders to work alongside us to address this social justice issue facing our most vulnerable communities. The confidence that RBBB has in our regularly produced impact data helps us build trusting relationships with our philanthropic community. That dynamic allows us the freedom to do what we do best, but also gives us the self-assurance to invite feedback to improve further. Just this last year, Marianne Mago Cracchiolo from the Steele Foundation helped us identify a gap in our internal Key Performance Indicators that led to a measurable boost in the number of students we have been able to serve per school. RBBB can do better as a result of these candid, confident conversations and partnerships.

Funders' confidence in RBBB's work also encourages them to offer unrestricted financial support, investing in RBBB to do what we know we do best. This year, that meant deciding to significantly augment our middle management team to invest in capacity at District levels to drive program quality and student attendance. We also added marketing, fundraising and data analytics positions. We know what we do well, now we can do more of it better, and then share that success with our community. It's a cycle of success.

#### Sophie Etchart, Founder/CEO, Read Better Be Better

Sophie Etchart was born in Connecticut but raised and educated in England. She studied at the University of Newcastle-Upon-Tyne. Upon graduation, she joined a financial services agency specializing in board-level strategic HR consulting before Sophie committed to a full transition into the non-profit sector.

Once there, Sophie managed SKIP, an international development organization in northern Peru, and a team of 25 staff and volunteers working with 330 young people aged 3-17 for 2 years. Sophie met her husband, an Arizona native, in Peru and moved to Phoenix in 2012. She spent 2 years managing the JA BizTown® team at Junior Achievement. There, Sophie identified the need for basic reading comprehension support. The JA BizTown® program serves over 20,000 students per year, an alarming number of whom had neither the focus nor the foundational skills to obtain the most value from the experience. When the "Move On When Reading" law was announced, she decided that the timing was critical to support those 3rd graders at risk of being kept behind.

Read Better Be Better is based on the proven SKIP model and adapted to the current environment. In 2017, Sophie was recognized as one of Phoenix Business Journal's 40 Under 40 who are younger business leaders making an impact in the Phoenix area. She lives in the Encanto District of Downtown Phoenix with her husband Andy, her son Cody and two dogs.



#### Rachel Aja, Government & Regulatory Affairs Manager, Cox Communications

Rachel Aja is a native Arizonan, and attended the University of Arizona in Tucson. She has been involved in a variety of volunteer organizations, including the Hugh O'Brien Youth Leadership Program and the Luke Air Force Base Honorary Commander Program.

# **Our Solution**



Read Better Be Better is the only nonprofit organization in Arizona that engages youth leaders to help solve the state's literacy crisis.

We train 6-8th grade students to implement a highly-structured after-school curriculum for 3rd-grade students considered to be at risk of being retained, in compliance with the Arizona State Literacy Plan.

# **Empowering Readers**

The Read Better Be Better focus couldn't be clearer: Help children improve literacy skills and become better learners. And for the fourth consecutive program year, RBBB has delivered with students outperforming non-participating peers by more than 20% on standardized reading comprehension tests.

It isn't difficult to see why our message resonates with struggling readers who are average third graders. Like most children, they are seekers of and receptacles for learning and positivity.


Avondale Elementary School District Principal, Lori Goslar made note of the program's impact on her campus this past Spring. "Behavior improves, confidence grows and students are gaining growth results in student work and test scores." In fact, RBBB students at Avondale ESD's Michael Anderson Elementary saw 23.6% more growth over their non-participating peers. Meanwhile,

and only the first-year participating, Alhambra Elementary School District had 93% of parents reporting that their child could understand what they read better than before participating in RBBB. And Carol G. Peck Elementary Principal Melinda Schlosser went one step further, saying "The experience has been incredibly positive for everyone. Data is important, but I want to make sure the intangible effects get reported, because they matter. This program makes a difference in the lives of kids."

Because that is what RBBB does for Readers: we show students they have the power to learn where they once saw only difficulty. We make the academic world one of opportunity. RBBB shows each child that a perceived obstacle can be overcome with the right attitude and effort, and that gains beyond the initial goal of doing better in school and reading can be achieved: you also gain friends and habits that help you in everyday life.

Noah, a third grade Reader in the Avondale Elementary School District made note of how RBBB changed not only his reading comprehension but also liked how the program changed him for the better. "I will have kind manners and listen to teachers." And Kaleb, a Reader at Michael Anderson Elementary, said, "It made me love reading more at home!"

RBBB takes a different approach to tackling Arizona's literacy crisis. Our program develops community youth leaders through service-learning.

Reading Leaders are our superheroes. Middle school students make the decision to volunteer with younger students, often sacrificing other extracurricular activities and social activities. This commitment to excellence is their beginning journey to personal, academic and community development.

In fact, 86% of Leaders self-report that they have what it takes to be a good leader after participating in RBBB. Avondale Elementary School District Principal Lori Goslar noted, "Differences I have seen within the [middle schoolers] include their belief in themselves and their ability to articulate their role in service to our school community. They know they have made a new friend, served as a mentor and can add this experience to their own resume." Leader Natalie from Desert Thunder School shared her experience, "This program helped me because after school I would do things I wasn't supposed to and I wanted to change." By focusing on being a positive role model for their Readers, many students experience positive changes in their overall behavior.

Their leadership role in RBBB allows middle school students to discover unknown talents or skills they often don't know they possess. Leader Abbie at Copper Trails said, "I think about education problems differently and realize how many there are." Leader Connier at Encanto-Clarendon said, "The program changed me by letting me see through a 3rd grader's eyes and lets me see what struggles they go through."

Beyond building the academic success of 3rd graders, RBBB works to foster academic and social skills of future civic leaders who have a strong sense of community, who know how to problem-solve and who have a focus on education to find the solutions needed.

#### **School Climate and Culture**

Read Be Better Be concentrates on student growth in both reading and leadership. But students aren't the only ones that benefit from our program. School climate and culture receive positive gains. Across the board, students take the 'Be Excellent' and 'Be Kind' messaging learned in RBBB with them into their classrooms and beyond.

Whittier Elementary Principal Amy Rendon said, "We have seen tremendous growth. [Leaders/Readers] leadership, mutual respect, and behaviors curbed since RBBB! RBBB is building student voice on campus." Teachers see the results of the program spilling into their classrooms too. "8th graders are always around either helping or just saying hi to the 3rd graders," said Mrs. Alvarez from Fine Arts Academy in Littleton Elementary School District. The intergrade relationships developed in RBBB extend to their everyday interactions.

And RBBB doesn't stop at inspiring good relationships among students. We work closely with school educators and administrators to help address their literacy needs. Our reading intervention

is there to support the amazing work Arizona's educators do every day. But our relationship isn't limited to academics. Our team does its best to ensure we are a valuable part of the school's community, as well as be a way for schools to enhance the community and culture they want for their students. "...this was our first year as a K-8 school, so the community this program built was hugely positive for us," said Carol G. Peck Principal, Melinda Schlosser.

### **Workforce Development**

Arizona faces a critical shortage of high-quality teachers. The 2018-2019 school year saw 1,443 vacant teaching positions; 3,357 classrooms were filled with under-qualified teachers who don't meet standard teaching requirements. 427 teachers severed their employment contract within the first few months of the school year (Arizona School Personnel Administrators Association, 2018).

To help address the shortage epidemic, Read Better Be Better works to develop a qualified workforce with student teachers. RBBB partners with higher education institutions to give students the opportunity to gain invaluable classroom management experience and better prepare them for the demands of an under-resourced education system. In addition, students gain more experience working with the diverse student populations that make up our state.

Site Leader Alexa Clark said, "Working with RBBB has provided me with a great deal of assets to utilize as an Elementary Education major. The exposure and experience I have gained...as well as the behavioral management techniques taught to me...have greatly improved


my confidence in the classroom. I now feel that I am capable enough to facilitate productive lessons and help each and every one of my future students achieve their full potential."

The ability to work with school administrators creates opportunities for future job placement too. These factors add up to a teaching student better prepared for our education climate and for schools to receive highly-qualified, informed and experienced education professionals. Caroline Yarborough is an education major and a RBBB Site Leader. She found the hands-on work with students beneficial. "I plan on becoming a high school English teacher. I have gained confidence leading a classroom through RBBB and I will take that confidence into my future career," said Yarborough.

By giving education majors an opportunity to apply their learning to the classroom and to gain real-world experience in classrooms, RBBB helps build an education workforce prepared to meet the needs of Arizona classrooms.

# Empowering Families

Read Better Be Better is laser-focused on 3rd-grade reading comprehension. What sets RBBB apart from other 3rd grade reading organizations, however, is that our impact doesn't start and end with reading growth. RBBB is the only Arizona literacy program that engages middle school leaders, inspiring them to become youth leaders – in the classroom and beyond.


RBBB's program trains middle schoolers to model critical thinking for reading comprehension. This effective modeling means 6th-8th graders memorize how to better teach others. Why is this important?

The Read Better Be Better program has a ripple effect. Participating students have siblings, cousins, friends - even older family members - who benefit from the literacy skills and techniques implemented in RBBB. Students often tell RBBB Site Leaders how the program helps them with family members.

"It encouraged me to help my little siblings at home," said Sophia, a Leader at Whittier Elementary. And she isn't the

only Reading Leader to report success using RBBB's program at home. "Now, when my sisters ask [me] to teach them something, I will have a better understanding of what to do," said Michael Anderson Elementary Leader, Natalie.

With RBBB's classroom rules of excellence and kindness, students reap more rewards than extending academic skills in program. Reading Leaders' personal growth within the program impacts to their home life and builds stronger families.





# Empowering Companies

The development of a statewide quality workforce relies upon ensuring students read at grade-level.

The consequence of students exiting school and entering the workforce without proper reading proficiency and academic success is directly correlated to corporate investments in high caliber employees. To guarantee productivity, businesses must address the deficiencies of any student entering their workforce: including reading proficiency and comprehension. Employee retraining is expensive and ultimately may prove ineffective.

Read Better Be Better addresses reading proficiency gaps in students prior to their leaving elementary school, making them more successful in higher learning. RBBB bolsters our state's and nation's quality workforce.





